Low note...When The Washington Opera hired Placido Domingo to be its artistic director in 1996, its euphoric board of trustees gave the tenor just about anything he wanted. The results, according to a case study of the opera by Harvard's Kennedy School of Government,



were better performances, a higher profile and mounting debt.

Faulting the trustees for a lack of foresight, the study says the opera almost ran into "serious trouble" between 1995 and 1998.

Domingo's presence certainly gave the company international cachet. And when he added operas and imported world-class singers, attendance soared. But so did costs.

The opera's 1997-98 season posted a \$658,000 deficit, according to the study, which was commissioned and paid for by trustee Hilda Ochoa Brillembourg. The following year, that figure had grown to \$1.26 million.

As one staffer observed, "Domingo is a visionary when it comes to opera. But it's hard for us to tell him about financial constraints."

The opera's productions now cost the company an average of \$2.6 million, the study found. And while most performances are sold out, box office receipts cover only 60 percent of the company's costs. The rest must come from contributions and fundraisers, which is why this month's Domingo gala, expected to raise more than \$2 million, is so crucial to the opera's financial health.

The study does credit Domingo with becoming more sensitive to costs. And the trustees, who include socialite **Betty Scripps-Harvey**, chocolate billionaire **John Mars** and powerful PR operative **Michael Deaver**, win praise for selling the former Woodward and Lothrop department store — a gift from opera devotee **Betty Casey** — when it became clear that converting it into an opera house would cost close to \$200 million.
